ATTENTION FEDERAL WAY: ROAD CONSTRUCTION UPDATES TO HELP YOU PLAN



288th Road Diet – Ph 1 (Military Road to East City Limits)

Permanent Lane Closures – Starting 9-14-23: This section of 288th will be permanently reduced to one (1) travel lane in each direction. The outside WB and EB travel lanes will be closed to facilitate pavement patching and grinding between **9-14-23 and 9-18-23**.

Paving will occur on 9-19 and 9-20 (weather permitting).

Starting on 9-20-23 (after paving is complete), the road will be striped to its permanent configuration of:

- One travel lane in each direction.
- One bike lane in each direction.
- A two-way center turn lane.

The initial striping will be temporary until the pavement can cure for placement of the permanent striping. The new lane configuration provides safety for left-turning vehicles (with the two-way left turn lane) and cyclists (new bicycle lanes) while providing adequate capacity for vehicle volumes.

Federal Way Link Extension

Receive free trees during our 2023 tree giveaway!

The Sound Transit Federal Way Link Extension project in collaboration with our construction contractor, Kiewit, is providing 4,000 trees to community members and organizations in Kent, Des Moines, SeaTac, and Federal Way. The project will aim to distribute 1,000 trees per year between 2021 and 2024.

Trees will be provided to people looking to plant them near the FWLE alignment, in the cities of SeaTac, Kent, Des Moines, and Federal Way, with limited exceptions considered. Community-based organizations, neighborhood groups, environmental associations, classroom-based programs, community gardens, advocacy groups, and community members are all welcome to request trees.

What types of trees will be provided?

Young trees will be in one-gallon pots and vary in height from 1 - 2 feet tall. Most available tree species will be about 25 - 35 feet tall at maturity. We are also offering native tree species which can grow to approximately 200 feet at maturity.

Things to consider before planting

- Young trees need a great deal of care and because we are unable to provide long-term maintenance for all of our trees, it is critical that someone can water the tree for at least the first 5 summers after it is planted.
- How much planting space do you have available? Large native trees, such as Douglas Fir at maturity, have extensive root systems that can impact pavement, concrete, etc.
- First time tree planter? Review more tree planting tips, at bit.ly/Treetips.

Frequently Asked Questions

Why is Sound Transit and their contractor Kiewit providing free trees to residents of Federal Way, Des Moines, SeaTac and Kent?

In addition to fulfilling replanting requirements along the Federal Way Link Extension, our construction contractor, Kiewit, committed to providing 1,000 trees per year for four years to communities near the alignment.

Why are trees only available in fall and winter?

Fall is the best time to plant a tree outside in our geographic area. Trees planted in the fall are more likely to survive our hot, dry summer season because our naturally wet winters help overcome the shock of planting. Trees planted in the spring and summer often die.

Can I apply for trees if I rent my house?

Yes! However, you should get permission from the homeowner before you apply for trees through our program. Consider who will take care of the trees (i.e. pruning and watering) during the tree's crucial establishment years (first 5 years after planting) and beyond.

Can I request a tree that's not on your planting list?

No. We secure trees from nurseries far in advance of the application opening. We cannot change that order and can offer only what we have already purchased. You can, however, send us suggestions for trees you would like to see offered in the future and we will take that into consideration.

How do I avoid hitting an underground utility line when I dig my planting hole?

Not only is it within your interest to contact the Utilities Underground Location Center before you plant a tree, it's the law. Before you plant your tree, call 1 (800) 424-5555 (or 811) at least 2 days before you plan to dig. Visibly mark your proposed planting location in white before the utility companies arrive. Utility companies will mark the location of your water, electric, and gas lines. You should also know where your side sewer line is located before digging your planting hole. Plant your tree at least 10 feet away from your sewer line.

How do we choose what species are offered?

We strive to offer species that the public will be most interested in planting. However, our species selection is based on a number of guidelines like how tall a tree will be at maturity, whether the species is recommended in the Pacific Northwest, and what species the nurseries have available among other things.
