HIDDEN LESSONS FROM THE **WASHINGTON HUSKIES**



Here in Puget Sound, we're all the Washington (13-0) vs. Texas (12-1) College Football Playoff

(CFP) Semifinal at the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans on January 1, 2024. This season, single digits have decided eight of the last nine games Like the Huskies, our story in played by UW. The previous four wins by the Huskies have been by a total of only 15 points!

There is a story behind this trend...

We can learn valuable lessons from the nail-biting and close finishes of the University of Washington this year. The Huskies are the secondranked team in the nation.

Despite facing adversity, the Pac-12 Champion Dawgs found a way to win. They overcame adversity against the Beavers in pouring rain in Corvallis, Oregon, and defeated the Oregon Ducks twice in 2023. UW quarterback Michael Penix Jr., the runner-up for the 2023 Heisman trophy, has been one of the best stories in college

football. For the second consecutive year, Penix Jr. was the top passer in the nation. throwing for 4,218 yards.

College football has always been a big part of my life. I played at UW

all four years under the legendary Coach Don James, who taught me lessons about life. If you stop by my office, you'll see a copy of "The Thursday Speeches: Lessons in Life, Leadership, and Football from Coach Don James" that sits on my desk every day.

Coach James led his team with a CEO mindset: accountability, discipline, focus, no excuses, systems in place for everything, teamwork, and results. Coach James persevered and prevailed even was a wealth of knowledge and instilled a playbook for each of us to obstacles. prepare for everyday challenges.

Dr. Peter Tormey, a former UW linebacker, in the early years of the James era, collected the speeches and put the book together in 2014 as a tribute to Coach James. Peter is Chris Tormey's older brother (an assistant coach at Washington for 16 seasons). He was also my position coach for several seasons. . As my position coach, I had the opportunity to listen and learn from Coach Tormey every day.

The stage is set! Coach Tormey had a very memorable quote that I live by every day:

"The definition of commitment is looking ahead to removing the option to quit."

Think about that for a moment.

These are words to live by. We all face challenges, disappointments, and setbacks. How we respond to those challenges sets the course for our lives.

Federal Way is one of resilience and determination. No matter the challenge we will never give up in the face of adversity.

As we approach the 2024 State Legislative Session, my top priority is to focus on police pursuit laws. We are taking proactive measures to ensure that our Federal Way Police Department officers have the necessary tools to safeguard our community against crime. The crime numbers are rising in our region, not just in Federal Way. We will not tolerate thieves controlling our communities' narrative and will tackle this issue daily.



OUR FWPD TRAFFIC UNIT EMPHASIZES THE SIGNIFICANCE OF "NICK AND DEREK'S PROJECT"



The Federal Way Police Department (FWPD) serves our community as a full-service law enforcement agency. The FWPD Traffic Unit comprises dedicated officers and supervisors who focus on providing excellent service to our community members and visitors.

Our FWPD Traffic Unit focuses on providing the safest possible roadways for motorists and pedestrians through education and enforcement.

For the past decade, we have utilized specially designated funding to enhance Driving Under The Influence (DUI), speeding, and distracted driving patrols.

This allocation of funds comes in the name of the "Nick and Derek Project" in honor of two Decatur High School students, Nicholas Hodgins and Derek King, killed in a DUI collision on Interstate 5 on June 9, 2010, only days before their graduation.

These "Nick and Derek" traffic patrol efforts allow officers to focus strictly on traffic enforcement, providing a solid example of our continuous commitment to promoting responsible driving habits.

DUI Enforcement: DUI remains a leading cause of collisions, injuries, and fatalities. The Nick and Derek Project allocates resources to combat impaired driving. We hope to deter DUI driving in our region, preventing tragic outcomes.



Processing a subject for DUI takes between two to four hours. When a police officer is taken off the street to handle one emergency call, they become unavailable to respond to other emergencies. This project allows the FWPD Traffic Unit to put additional officers on the road and removes the burden from general patrol officers. This community and the FWPD will not tolerate distracted driving and DUIs in our city.

Speeding Enforcement: Speeding remains a significant contributor to traffic collisions and fatalities. The Nick and Derek Project emphasizes targeted speeding enforcement to address this issue. By strategically placing officers in high-risk areas and utilizing speed measuring devices, the FWPD Traffic Unit can enforce speed limits and raise awareness about the dangers of excessive speeding.

Distracted Driving Initiatives: With the recent proliferation of smartphones and other electronic devices, distracted driving has become a growing concern nationwide. The Nick and Derek Project tackles this issue through targeted enforcement operations.

The Nick and Derek Project is a testament to our ongoing dedication to enhancing road safety in our community.

- What made you want to get involved in City government? My younger sister and I escaped from Vietnam more than 45 years ago, and we ended up in a refugee camp in Malaysia. We wanted to go to America, but at that time, it was very difficult to get resettlement in the U.S. After spending 9-months in the refugee camp, we were allowed to settle in the U.S. Since then, I promised myself that one day I would find a way to repay the debt to the people of this country for giving us a second chance in life. Being a public servant has helped me fulfill that promise.
- What is the most rewarding part of being part of City government? The most rewarding part of being part of City government is working collaboratively with other councilmembers, the Mayor, City staff, and residents to move the City forward. Also, I enjoy seeing how our decision impact the community usually within weeks or a few months.



- What have you enjoyed most about being a Councilmember? I consider myself as the voice of the underprivileged, under-served people in the community. I can offer a different perspective, especially, the perspective of a person of color. I also hope that by being a member of the Council, I inspire others to get involved and run for public office.
- What is your vision for Federal Way's future? Diversity and inclusion, having a Safe City, building a technology hub, be able to attract and retain some S&P 500 companies, have a walkable downtown, and be first class in parks and recreation.
- What projects are you currently focused on? As Chair of the Finance, Economic Development &
 Regional Affairs Committee (FEDRAC), I continue to work collaboratively with Finance staff, led by Director
 Steve Groom, to ensure our finances are in top condition, our investments are sound, as well as to prepare
 for any potential downturn in the economy. Public Safety and Downtown Development are also my priorities.
- What makes Federal Way so special? It's people. The City has grown to more than 100,000 residents. We
 are one of the most diverse cities in the state. Our people come from all over the world and speak more than
 140 languages. We have a unique opportunity to create an inclusive community where we embrace and
 celebrate different people and cultures.
- Where is your favorite place to go in Federal Way? There are so many places in Federal Way that I would consider a "favorite". I enjoy many things that Federal Way has to offer from food at local restaurants, the Farmers Market, the PAEC, parks and lakes.






COOKIES WITH MRS. CLAUS RETURNS TO THE FWCC!


Preschool Education: The preschool teachers recently held individual meetings with each family to discuss their preschooler's development and achievements this school year.
