



YOUNG ADULTS CAN LEARN ABOUT LAW ENFORCEMENT THROUGH FWPD



The City proudly announces that our **Federal Way Police Department** sponsors a **Police Explorer Post** overseen by police officers and detective advisors.

FWPD supports the program with equipment, training, and mentoring in the law enforcement career field. **The program is open to all youth and young adults aged 14 to 21**.

The police explorer program is designed for young adults passionate about law enforcement and seeking guidance from experienced police officers.

They gather for activities related to law enforcement. These activities include "explorer challenges" and the "explorer academy," which promote teamwork and friendly competition with other explorer posts.

Police explorers also provide valuable service to the community by assisting the police department at special events, such as the Red, White, and Blues Festival. Explorers routinely help in various other police-related activities and are an essential force multiplier for the police department at significant events.

This program is **nearly self-funded** due to pro-active post fundraising efforts.

As an explorer, you will learn about the many different aspects of law enforcement intended to enhance your ability to enter into the law enforcement career field.

Some skills taught include officer safety techniques, de-escalating resources and response, handling high-risk and routine calls, report writing, and more.

Federal Way Police Explorers are trained and equipped with the basic skills required to work as volunteer representatives of the Federal Way Police Department.

When attending an event at the PAEC, you'll likely meet **Brian Hoffman**, the **General Manager of Oak View Group 360**, who oversees all eventrelated business for our City and other renters of Federal Way's state-ofthe-art facility.

With over 20 years of experience in event management, Hoffman, **GM of the PAEC since August 2018,** has been described as a true master of his craft.

"Brian cares about the employees, the community, and the PAEC," said **Stephen Marquez, Assistant General Manager, Director of Operations**.

Hoffman is willing to work almost every day without taking any time off. Hoffman's co-workers would confidently tell you the PAEC is his other home.

"Our job is to make Brian look good. When he leads by example, it makes our jobs easier," said Marquez. "We provide that (memorable) experience to everyone who walks through that door. In the end, we wind up in the office debriefing and cracking jokes. We do things that not everybody gets to do: provide entertainment for the community."

Hoffman is excited about how the community can consistently enjoy high-quality entertainment through our fantastic partnership with the PAEC!

"We're getting more recognized from agents in the industry," said Hoffman. "Ryan Adams, for example, played (at the PAEC) in March. We got a call (from his agency), and we're negotiating to bring him back next June. With the continued vision of the City with the TC-3 (Town Center 3) project and having more people in our backyard, it will be huge. We're excited we have an opportunity to be a part of that."

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATE

The 2023 Overlay will be "substantially completed this week." Our Public Works Department wants to thank ICON Materials for getting this project completed!

Our contractor will still work around the City for several weeks, adjusting utilities, striping, and completing miscellaneous work.

The overlay program is funded through the State Motor Vehicle Tax (Gas Tax) and utility taxes. The program analyzes and rates the existing road network every two years to determine how to leverage the available funding to repair the most significant number of roadways.

The partnership between **Hachinohe** and **Federal Way**, through the Sister Cities program, is highly valued by the City as it fosters goodwill.



COUNCIL'S CORNER



Following the success of the American Revolution, through the establishment of an independent government, elected officials made the monumental decision to place governing bodies within the growing municipalities.

These governing bodies shared a lot of decision-making responsibilities, including business regulation, taxation, environmental regulations, specifically zoning, property taxes, and public parks. The governing bodies exercised their authority to determine land usage within the municipalities.

In the late 1800s, Federal Way was predominantly known for its logging industry. With the completion of Highway 99 connecting Seattle and Tacoma, Federal Way became more of a settlement community, building schools and housing areas with a commercial space that included a shopping center and theme park.



There were many efforts to make Federal Way a City, but they were only successful on March 14, 1989. That day, the voters approved incorporation with a majority vote of 9,838 in favor and 4,381 against.

On September 19, 1989, the **first City Council was elected** to office from a pool of 37 candidates. Seven of those 37 candidates were chosen: **Debbie Ertel, Mary Gates, Lynn Templeton, Bob Stead, Joel Marks, Jim Webster, and Jim Handmacher**.

On October 3, 1989, Ertel was appointed Mayor, with Gates appointed Deputy Mayor. These seven trailblazers led the way for the new government to shape and build our beautiful City into what it is today.

The City Council represents a population of over 100,000 citizens, focusing on creating a community *Centered on Opportunity* and providing an excellent place to live, work, and play!
