

FWPD OFFICER COLLEEN BORDERS IS HONORED WITH THE LIFE-SAVING AWARD



Protecting and serving the Federal Way community! In Council Chambers at City Hall, Deputy Chief Kyle Sumpter and Chief of Police Andy Hwang of the FWPD took a moment to acknowledge Officer Colleen Borders for her quick action in saving a 6-year-old child from drowning in Federal Way last summer.

On July 11, 2022, at 3:30 p.m., a call came to 911 regarding a child who drowned at the swimming pool at apartments on S. 320th Street.

On an unrelated task, Federal Way Police Department (FWPD) officer Colleen Borders was at a neighboring business and heard the call aired over the radio.

Colleen immediately responded to the swimming pool next door and found an unresponsive 6-year-old male who had already been removed from the water, lying on the ground next to the pool.

Colleen performed CPR on the child, cleared his airway, and saved the boy's life.

Colleen was honored with a life-saving award for her outstanding job performance. The City of Federal Way thanks Colleen for her promptness and commitment to excellence.





OUR FWPD IS HOSTING A SERVICE DOG IN TRAINING FROM GUIDE DOGS FOR THE BLIND



Making It Happen! Sarah Butts, Records Specialist, will raise and train a Labrador or Golden Retriever in basic obedience, public socialization, and appropriate manners in an office environment and at home for up to a year. Sarah will primarily focus her training of this future guide dog on remaining calm and settled while ignoring the usual distractions of a bustling office environment.

Federal Way Police Department (FWPD) Records Specialist Sarah Butts had the idea and passion to bring the unique service project of raising and training a future guide dog for people who are blind to the City of Federal Way.

Now, her dream is becoming an extraordinary reality!

The Police Department's mission includes enhancing the quality of life for all within the City of Federal Way, which aligns with the Guide Dogs for the Blind's (GDB) mission of creating life-changing partnerships for visually impaired individuals while strengthening communities.

The FWPD and Sarah are excited to foster the growth and development of this future guide dog to hopefully one day serve those who are blind and support them in empowering their mobility and independence.

Once Sarah and her service dog in training complete all the primary training goals set forth by GDB, it will return to Guide Dogs for the Blind for formal guide work training in harness before its partnership with visionimpaired individuals.

Sarah eagerly anticipates the announcement of her dog's arrival from GDB so they can begin training with our FWPD over the next year!

OUR EMERGENCY MANAGER HOLDS CERT TRAINING AT TAF@SAGHALIE IN FEDERAL WAY



Emergency Manager Kevin Pelley (pictured above in the middle) spoke with the group about the CERT Disaster Simulation Exercise last week. 22 students divided into four teams and rotated through four stations where experienced CERT cadre evaluated their performance. They extinguished fires, searched classrooms to find and extract survivors, and performed lifesaving medical measures. Students used levers and blocking to simulate rescuing a trapped survivor from debris on a mannequin.

On November 15, the Greater Federal Way Community Emergency Management Program organized a disaster simulation at TAF@Saghalie School in Federal Way. The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Basic Course concluded with a disaster exercise, following eight weeks of training to acquire and apply essential skills.

When the students arrived at the incident command post for the simulation exercise, they were informed that an airplane had crashed into the Federal Way Fred Meyer.

This had overwhelmed the first responders, and a portion of the airplane had broken off and struck Saghalie School.

The CERT volunteers were needed to fight small fires and find and treat survivors.

South King Fire and Federal Way Police conducted a training exercise with students. Roll players simulated severe injuries, training new CERT volunteers to assist during emergencies.

Thanks to Emergency Manager Kevin Pelley for ensuring our community is always prepared!

What made you want to get involved in City government? It is a pleasure to work with our talented city staff in planning the mixed-use development of the city-owned TC-3 property (where the Performing Arts & Event Center and the recently demolished old Target building are located). This development will set the standard and pave the way for additional high-quality downtown development.

What makes Federal Way so special? The beauty of our natural surroundings and the diversity of the people in our community make Federal Way special. I'm grateful that I was able to raise my five children in a community where we have friends and neighbors from a broad array of cultures, ethnicities, religions and backgrounds. It has helped me and can help all of us have a greater appreciation and love for those who are different than ourselves.





THE PAEC NEWS!


