John and Mary Conna were African-American pioneers in the early history of Washington State.


On October 13, the Conna family partnered with King County Metro to celebrate the Conna Family NW Black Pioneers project at 1157 S. 320th Street in Federal Way.

The family organizers said the bus shelter photo mural pays homage to their lives and celebrates their contributions to national and local civic causes, political activism, and land ownership in our state.

"John Conna's story is truly remarkable," Federal Way Mayor Jim Ferrell said. "He was a businessperson and owned 157 acres at the southeast side of Panther

Lake here in Federal Way before his passing in 1921. Born into slavery in Texas in 1843, Mr. Conna faced numerous challenges before gaining his freedom and fighting in Civil War battles, including the Siege of Port Hudson, Louisiana. He was appointed assistant sergeant-at-arms of the 1889 Washington Territorial House of Representatives."

John's great-granddaughter, Maisha Barnett, hopes her great-grandfather will become the first African-American to have a landmark in Federal Way.

FWPD ACTIVATES THREE SUBSTATION LOCATIONS TO KEEP COMMUNITY SAFE





The Federal Way Police Department (FWPD) operates three active substations in the City: The Commons Mall substation, the Downtown Substation, and the Pacific Highway Substation near Federal Way High School.

The Commons Mall substation, managed by Lieutenant RB Blackshear, is the main base of operations with three police officers.

This program falls under the Patrol Specialty Assignments command.

Our FWPD officers at The Commons maintain constant contact with youth at the mall, carry out foot patrols, and handle shoplifting and other criminal cases. They also engage in crime prevention contacts by maintaining officer presence.

The Downtown Substation hosts the Traffic Unit and Special Operations Officers near the Transit Center.

The strategic locations of the substations provide the public with high police visibility and reduce response time, advancing FWPD's mission of enhancing the quality of life for residents, visitors, and businesses within our City.

THE FALL SEASON MEANS LEAVES EVERYWHERE; WHERE CAN YOU PUT THEM ALL?



Now is the perfect time to take charge and clean up the streets and grass covered in fall leaves!

Sure, letting the leaves break down naturally is one option, but what if you prefer to take action and clean them up?

What's the best and safest way to dispose of them?

The Public Works Department has provided excellent recommendations below on what to do with the fall leaves.

We appreciate the Public Works team sharing this friendly reminder with our Federal Way community!





WHY SHOULD I CLEAN OFF MY STORM DRAINS? Fallen leaves clog storm drains, causing flooding and property damage, and polluting our rivers, lakes and streams. Raking or blowing leaves into the storm drain is a violation of City Code.

CAN I USE A LEAF BLOWER TO CLEAN UP MY YARD?

Avoid blowing leaves into the street, where they clog storm drains. Blow or rake leaves into a pile and then clean them up.

WHAT SHOULD I DO WITH THE LEAVES? You have a couple options for disposal. You can either compost them or put them in your yard waste cart.

WHAT IF I USE A YARD SERVICE COMPANY? Yard service companies are also responsible for keeping yard debris out of storm drains.

THE FEDERAL WAY LIBRARY HOSTED OUR FIRST FW COMMUNITY COURT THIS MONTH



Municipal Court Judge David A. Larson, pictured at the table on October 5, noted that credit for the success belongs to Stacie Scarpaci, Probation Supervisor, who coordinated with the library system and multiple service providers to make this a reality. **The Federal Way Community Court** has been in operation since March 2018.

Still, on October 5, it held its first session at the Federal Way Library on 1st Way South in partnership with the King County Library System and multiple service providers and resources.

The Municipal Court partnered with the King County Library System to create a resource center for court participants and public members who need assistance.

"The library system and the court systems were trying to do the same thing for the same people, so we decided to join forces to maximize our reach," **said Municipal Court Judge David A. Larson**.

The Municipal Court and the Federal Way Library have contracts for peer services with Peer Kent, meaning that when the resource center operates, access to peer services doubles at no additional expense to taxpayers. The library and the court substantially increased resource access by sharing their partnerships with providers.

Word of the partnership inspired new resource providers to join the effort, too. The Resource Center is open on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays of each month from 12:30-4:30 p.m. at the Federal Way Library, 34200 1st Way South. Starting January 1, 2024, the hours will be from 1-3:30 p.m.

Judge Larson and the City of Federal Way thank our fantastic Information Technology (IT) staff, who have consistently met the court's technology needs!
