Chaney Skadsen, Senior Planner and Rising From The Dust event organizer said: "This urban style development will set the bar for future growth in downtown."









ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SERVES UP EXCITING NEWS!



New mobile vendors in Federal Way **can complete and submit a checklist** to the City when they register for a **business license** here.

What is National Night Out?

- National Night Out on **August 1 from 6-9 p.m.** is a time for neighbors to gather and **“Give Crime A Going Away Party.”**

What should we do?

- Gather your next-door neighbors and hold a fun and safe block party, barbecue, or potluck; bring desserts and coffee, and plan activities for the kids!

Where do I start?

- Consider what event will work best for you and your neighborhood. For example, are there a lot of kids in the community? Who would you consider your target audience?

Can you give me examples of previous NNO events?

- Some examples of best events are barbecues and ice cream socials with music and games. Be creative and have fun - the options are endless!

Here is other information that will make your NNO event memorable:

- Make visiting teams feel welcome and invite them to have some food. Visiting groups can include City officials such as the Mayor, City Council members, police officers, firefighters, and other City employees.
- Be sure to ask your next-door neighbor for help! Determine the best place in your neighborhood to hold the event and then identify a start and end time (typical events go from 6-9 p.m.)
- Keep a list of everything needed for your event—tents, tables, chairs, plates, silverware, and napkins.

Section 19 in the Council Rules & Procedures discusses the importance and recognition of citizen advisory bodies. These advisory bodies are commissions, committees, and task forces, with members appointed by the Council after the application and interview process. The purpose of these bodies is to bring together viewpoints that might not otherwise be heard by bringing together a wide array of people from the City of Federal Way in a volunteer capacity towards public service. The City is honored to have **14 Citizen Advisory Bodies with over 60 members of the Federal Way Community.**

ATTENTION FEDERAL WAY DRIVERS



The City sends this friendly reminder: **please secure your vehicle loads before hitting the road.**

Did you know? Debris on highways caused by unsecured vehicle loads causes **over 300 traffic crashes in Washington state** annually, generating up to **40 percent of roadside litter.**

How can we fix this problem? If you travel at a lower speed while hauling something too heavy that could fall out, there's a better chance it won't.


For shorter trips, securing items on your vehicle is vital to keeping our roads safe and litter free. **Through June 1, 2023**, the City has received over **1,100 requests for garbage within the Right of Way.** Unfortunately, this prevents our **Public Works team** from completing more worthwhile projects for you in the City. Let's work together by securing our vehicle loads before driving away to keep the streets in Federal Way safer and litter-free! We appreciate your cooperation.
